AN ADVOCATE FOR A MORE ENABLING POLICY ENVIRONMENT

In 2019, PFC was actively involved in the effort to build a pathway for transformation of the regulatory framework for charities and foundations. PFC equally advocated for unlocking additional resources for innovative public good initiatives and community action.

PFC contributed to public hearings and written briefs that lead up to 190-page report entitled: *Catalyst for Change: A Roadmap to a Stronger Charitable Sector*. The Senate Special Committee on the Charitable Sector, which was established to review the impact of the voluntary sector in Canada and the federal and provincial laws and policies governing charities and non-profit organizations, released 42 recommendations covering a wide-range of issues important to the sector that detail the strategies and regulatory reforms needed to maximize the sector's impact in communities both in Canada and around the world.

PFC submitted a brief to the Ministère du Travail, de l'Emploi et de la Solidarité sociale who launched a consultation, entitled *Toward Greater Recognition and Support Of Community Action*, in late-2019 to gather proposals and comments from foundations with a view to developing a new government strategy for community action.




